WHAT TO DO IN AN EMERGENCY

In the hustle and bustle of everyday life it has been calculated that the average person will encounter a problem rated small to trivial once every two days. However, with sufficient preparation most crisise can be averted. The following is an extract from my forthcoming book; "Reducing Stress and Cutting out the Bad Vibes" (Pub. Penguin £5.99), which deals with these situations.

1. IF PURSUED BY A MAN-EATING SHARK:-

Check mirror, indicate left and carefully pull in. Allow shark to pass.

2. IF TRAPPED IN A LIFT WITH A PSEUDO-INTELLECTUAL:-

THE LIMIT CLUB - Demo Tape

Anybody in the third year plus might remember reading a gig review of "December's Child" in this very magazine last year. Well, to complicate matters, "The Limit Club" used to be Decembers Child until about six months ago when they changed their name.

Anyway, The Limit Club (who are Stuart Barnett, lead guitar and vocals, Andrew Hyde, rhythm guitar, Dave Westwick, bass guitar and Chris Arthurs, drums) have released a demo tape. This contains 'real' music; there is no manufactured, synthesized rubbish on this tape! No, it contains real guitars and drums and what's more they can even play their own instruments which is becoming unusual these days.

The lyrical content is also unusually good. It does not take an hour to work out what the songs are about, but at the same time the lyrics are cleverly written.

One not so good aspect of the tape is that there are only two songs on it (one written by Stuart, the other co-written with Andrew Hyde). Both of them are really good but obviously this cannot give you a real interpretation of what they might be like if you went to one of their gigs.


The first song, entitled "Came to Pieces", has a natty introduction and the vocals start off in a quiet fashion and build up to a crescendo at the chorus. It also actually finishes and does not fade away to nothing like most songs today. The other song is called "Not Waving But Drowning" which starts off faster and it's altogether quicker and the more immediate of the two. A definite toe-tapper for everybody, this contains quite a gutsy (do you mean 'gusty'? - Ed.) guitar solo from Andrew Hyde, in the middle. This again actually finishes - what more could you ask for? To sum it up in a word - brilliant - and I'd recommend it to anyone.
